## Greetings from Rev. Ken Jones (a.k.a. "Ken's Ken.")

White supremacy.

Those are powerful words. They conjure up images of lynchings, Jim Crow, burning crosses and white robes. We tend to hate the meaning of those words, and tend to think they apply mostly to things that are removed from us in space and time. It happened long ago and somewhere else.

And even when it happens closer to home, it certainly doesn't apply to our beloved faith community, Unitarian Universalism. We are not white supremacists!

It is relatively easy to say that, and to believe it, if one does happen to be a white Unitarian Universalist. And of course there is some truth to it – we affirm the worth and dignity of every person, and have a long history of standing up for racial justice.

It may be harder to say that, and to believe it, if you happen to be a Unitarian Universalist who is not white; if you are a black Unitarian Universalist. Indeed, there are many black Unitarian Universalists – today and throughout our history – who don't necessarily agree with that sentiment.

We're being asked to listen to what some of these people have to say. We're being asked to listen even if what they say makes us uncomfortable; even if what they say contradicts some of our most cherished beliefs about ourselves.

Some of them say that Unitarian Universalists are steeped in a culture of white supremacy. Many of their white allies are saying the same thing. I think we should listen.

This month, we're planning two of our Sunday services to do precisely that. They will both utilize resources from the UUA's "Promise and Practice of our Faith for Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism." (Information here: https://www.uua.org/giving/areas-support/funds/promise-and-practice) On Sunday, Feb. 11, Rev. Jones will lead a worship service drawing from this program, and the following Sunday, Feb. 18, our Sunday Services team will follow up with more voices of black UUs.

This is a particularly poignant conversation to have if one is familiar with the long and sometimes difficult history of African American people in Unitarian Universalism. If you don't know much about this history, I encourage you to read this recent article in the UU World magazine by the Rev. Dr. Mark Morrison-Reed: https://www.uuworld.org/articles/black-hole-white-uu-psyche.

I hope you will join me in this conversation with an open mind and heart.

#### UUCY Healthy Relations Team: Re-Affirming Our Healthy Relations Covenant

We promise to:

Treat each other with kindness
Celebrate each other's spiritual growth
Listen deeply to others
Speak with courage and humility
Share the ministry of this congregation

Get on the Bus! was the title of a presentation written and delivered by almost all of the members of the 2008 Healthy Relations Committee on Jan. 21st of this year.

This committee was charged with articulating a covenant – a set of mutual

promises about how we choose to pursue our spiritual lives together in community. It came about after a time of turmoil and transition. UUCY was between ministers and there was division among the congregation as to whether a minister was desired or necessary.

The committee took the work seriously, researching covenants from many other churches, holding many discussions, and ultimately deciding to embrace a simple, intergenerational set of promises that all could remember and use. Recognizing the value of story as a medium for learning, each promise was presented as a journey – travelers on a bus trying to get to Mt. Rainier but having great difficulty arriving. At a follow up service, members and friends were invited to sign the cardboard bus as a symbol of personal commitment.

The metaphorical and cardboard buses were resurrected for the Jan. 21st service. UUCY may be in a different place now with different variations of strengths and challenges, but after being examined with an eye to the present and future as well as lessons learned from the past, it was determined that our covenant remains a relevant, necessary, useful and important guide in our church and in our world.


#### **UUCY Book Club**

#### The Invention of Wings by Sue Monk Kidd

Sue Monk Kidd's sweeping novel is set in motion on Sarah's eleventh birthday, when she is given ownership of ten year old Handful, who is to be her handmaid. We follow their remarkable journeys over the next thirty five years, as both strive for a life of their own, dramatically shaping each other's destinies and forming a complex relationship marked by guilt, defiance, estrangement and the uneasy ways of love. As the stories build to a riveting climax, Handful will endure loss and sorrow, finding courage and a sense of self in the process. Sarah will experience crushed hopes, betrayal, unrequited love, and ostracism before leaving Charleston to find her place alongside her fearless younger sister, Angelina, as one of the early pioneers in the abolition and women's rights movements.

Inspired by the historical figure of Sarah Grimke, Kidd goes beyond the record to flesh out the rich interior lives of all of her characters, both real and invented, including Handful's cunning mother, Charlotte, who courts danger in her search for something better.



This exquisitely written novel is a triumph of storytelling that looks with unswerving eyes at a devastating wound in American history, through women whose struggles for liberation, empowerment, and expression will leave no reader unmoved.—Description excerpted from Inklings Bookshop website.
