### Greetings from Rev. Ken Jones (a.k.a. "Ken's Ken.")

Autumn arrives later this month, but for those of us who structure our lives around school, church, and many work schedules, the first of September (or, sometimes, the conclusion of Labor Day weekend) marks a time of seasonal transitions.

One way we do this at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Yakima – like at many other UU congregations – is with the Water Communion ceremony we do the Sunday after Labor Day (the 9th this year.) Each person or family is asked to bring a small amount of water that symbolizes where, or how, your spiritual thirst is quenched. In the ceremony, we merge all our separate waters into one, to symbolize our coming together as a religious community.

Also in this time of seasonal transitions, there are other changes afoot. I'd like to tell you about two of them:

The first is we're going to do a little mixing up of how our services and children's programs are run. For the last few years, we've had a Children's Chapel service before their Religious Education classes on all the Sundays on which we have RE classes. Under Religious Educator extraordinaire Kathy Lambert's direction, we'll continue doing that most Sundays when we're not having a pancake breakfast or all-family service in the sanctuary. But also, about once a month, we'll have the kids join us in the sanctuary for the first part of the service, which will include a story time or some other special focus on the kids before they go to their classes. We'll announce which Sundays are which in the order of service and the weekly update at least the week before, so stay tuned to hear what's coming up.

The other change I'd like to share with you is a bit more personal. Some of you have heard that I have recently accepted the invitation to serve the Kittitas Valley Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Ellensburg as their quarter-time minister, which starts this month. I'll be leading worship up there approximately one Sunday a month, and commuting up there at other times as needed. I fully expect to be able to pay more than adequate attention to both congregations. In fact, I'm very much looking forward to exploring ways that UUCY and KVUUC may learn from and share with one another. They are the physically closest UU congregation to us, yet in many ways they are very different. I look at this as an opportunity to learn and to grow – for me, and for both congregations.

I'll keep ya'll posted how my commuting up to Ellensburg may (or may not) affect when I'm available here in Yakima. For the time being, I'm going to continue keeping office hours at UUCY on Tuesday and Thursday mornings, if you want to just drop by to chat. But of course I'm also available at other times, so let me know if you'd like to meet.

Looking forward to another great church year! Ken





Nob Hill Blvd., for dinner and discussion of White Trash: The 400-Year History of Class in America by Nancy Isenberg. Everyone is welcome to join the no-host dinner. Come to what is always a lively discussion; you are welcome to enjoy dinner and the company and listen in if you have not had a chance to read this book.



Our next read will be a change of pace from serious non-fiction to the Pulitzer Prize winning comic novel, A Confederacy of Dunces by John Kennedy Toole. We will meet on Tuesday, November 13, at 6:00 PM at Taj Palace for dinner and discussion.



In A Confederacy of Dunces, find one of the most memorable characters in American fiction, Ignatius J. Reilly. A flatulent frustrated scholar deeply learned in medieval philosophy and American junk food, a brainy mammoth misfit imprisoned in a trashy world of Greyhound Buses and Doris Day movies, he is in violent revolt against the entire modern age.

The novel bursts into life on Canal Street, New Orleans. Ignatius' peripatetic employment takes him from Levy Pants, where he leads a workers' revolt, to the French Quarter, where he waddles behind a hot dog wagon that serves as his fortress.

Filled with unforgettable characters and unbelievable plot twists, shimmering with intelligence, and dazzling in its originality, Toole's comic classic just keeps getting better year after year.
