Greetings from Rev. Ken Jones (a.k.a. "Ken's Ken.")

There's a phrase that I don't often use - "cautious optimism."

Those who know me well know that I'm especially hesitant to use that phrase when it comes to the "next big thing" in consumer goods and services. Seeing the steady rise of irresponsible consumerism in my five plus decades on this planet, I've become pretty much a pessimist when I read the business pages.

Yet I must admit I do feel a sense of cautious optimism at one initiative I recently heard about. It's called "Loop" and it's a new way to shop for many consumer goods that people usually buy these days in disposable plastic packaging. The brainchild of entrepreneur Tom Szasky, Loop is a system in which people order everything from ice cream to shampoo online, have it delivered to their home in reusable packaging, and when that item is used up, they re-order. They leave out the empty package, and a new item is delivered and the old packaging is returned to be washed and re-used. It works (at least in theory) very much like the old "milk man" many of us grew up with.

I read about this with great interest, in part because I have taken to explaining my own shopping habits as "fanatical" to friends. For the last couple of decades, for the majority of household items I use, I take my own reusable containers to my local food co-op's bulk section, where I refill them with a plethora of dry goods like beans, rice, and detergent, as well as many liquid products such as oils, honey, and shampoo. (Yes, I know Yakima doesn't have a "local food co-op," so since moving here I've learned to take all my containers with me whenever I go to the west side or someplace where there is a reusable container-friendly bulk section and stock up.) I've spent many hours in various bulk sections around the state, and have developed my own rather meticulous method of greatly diminishing the amount of packaging I consume. Many people who witness this think I'm somewhat fanatical.

So one thought that ran through my mind when I heard about Loop was "It's about time!" I've often thought the old milk man model was a very good one in many ways (and I've also tried to minimize my packaging by participating in a local goat milk co-op in which I reuse my bottles, but alas, this season I've had to give that up.) There are some big questions to be answered, such as will this be a viable business? Or will it just be a niche market? Also, it may be that by the time this system makes inroads, it may already be too late, in a way. We have already poisoned our water, land, and air with so much plastic and micro plastic residue that even if this service takes off, we'll still be reaping the consequences for generations to come.

But still, I find reason to exercise cautious optimism. If nothing else, this service may prompt people to finally ask why it is that we rarely consider, when purchasing something, the implications of also purchasing the packaging it comes in.

Maybe I haven't been so fanatical after all.



Upcoming Titles for UUCY Book Club



January Book Club Meeting Notes: Icy roads kept several Book Club members away from our January 8 discussion of *The Other Einstein*. But those few who met debated the lines between fiction and fact for historical fiction. For this title in particular, we agreed, "fiction" seemed to override "historical."

March 12, 2019: The One-in-a Million Boy by Monica Wood (fiction)
An 11-year-old boy visits his elderly neighbor, Ona, weekly to help out with chores and listen to her reminisce about her long life from first love to second chances. One Saturday, he doesn't show up. But soon the boy's father arrives, determined to finish his son's good deed. Ona is set to discover that the world can surprise us at any age, and that sometimes sharing a loss is the only way to find ourselves again.

May 14, 2019: The Underground Railroad: A Novel by Colson Whitehead (fiction)



In Colson Whitehead's ingenious conception, the Underground Railroad is no mere metaphor: engineers and conductors operate a secret network of actual tracks and tunnels beneath the Southern soil. The novel follows Cora, a young slave from a cotton plantation in Georgia, on her harrowing flight from one state to the next, encountering, like Gulliver, strange yet familiar iterations of her own world at each stop. Re -creating the terrors of the antebellum era, Whitehead weaves into his novel the saga of our nation from the brutal abduction of Africans to the unfulfilled promises of the present day.
