Greetings from Rev. Ken Jones (a.k.a. "Ken's Ken.")

Change. Change is hard. Change is also inevitable.

And change can be liberating.

In the Buddhist tradition, one of the three marks of existence is impermanence, or the concept that all material things change. Nothing stays the same, not only from year to year but even from moment to moment. One reason we need to be spiritually grounded is to anchor ourselves in light of impermanence. Spiritual things don't change – everything else does.

Here at UUCY, we've been having a lot of conversations about "Housing Our Ministry," that is, exploring our options related to the physical place in which we meet regularly. Having purchased this beautiful and historic building nearly two decades ago, it serves us well, but our congregation, like nearly all congregations, is in a state of flux – or shall we say "impermanence?" Our building houses many aspects of our ministries, but it also "houses" a lot of empty space – space that we simply don't use anymore. It has also become apparent that staying in this building costs us a lot of money and effort, and while maintaining any facility for worship and gathering does inevitably cost money, there are specific concerns about future costs for primary maintenance and/or repairs that we, currently, lack the resources to cover.

So for the past eight or nine months, the Board and two committees have been delving into the questions about our options, and talking to many of you about your ideas, wishes, and concerns. The Board appointed a special "Building Committee" (Ray Gonzales, Ray Yates, and Nancy Born) to look into the practical and financial considerations of the various options, and the Committee on Shared Ministry (Susan Kaphammer, Chuck Forster, and Emilee Solomon) have been compiling "soft" data on what impacts different options would bring. Recently, these two committees have been working together to coordinate our efforts and to articulate what options are feasible for us to consider.

There may be some concerns about us moving too fast in such an endeavor – we need to carefully consider all options and implications, and seek out input from all stakeholders before making any long-term decisions. To those concerns I'd like to offer my reassurance that your Board, these committees, and all those involved in these discussions are committed to doing exactly that, and to practice transparency so that all know what is going on. In that spirit, the two committees are planning two open Q&A sessions after church services on May 19 and June 2. There will also be, of course, some discussion about our options at our Annual Meeting on June 9.

Purchasing this building some twenty years ago was an act of big and courageous faith, and no matter what we decide to do next it will remain a defining moment in the history of this congregation. That we'll never take away. But to continue to be true to the spirit of our liberal faith tradition as well as the courage of those who said "yes" two decades ago, we need to continue to seek out the most effective ways to practice our ministry for now and for the generations to come.

I invite you to participate in this important work. Because change is not only hard, it is inevitable.

Housing Our Ministry

Members of UUCY have been working on two committees to identify concerns and options for our congregation to decide how we might best "House Our Ministry." These committees recently met and scheduled times to share and discuss their information with church members and friends.

<u>All are encouraged to meet after services on Sunday, May</u> <u>19, or Sunday, June 2.</u>

Costs related to using and maintaining our building are a large portion of our annual budget. There is little leeway for significant upkeep or unforeseen emergency (i.e., painting the parapet, boiler failure or roof failure). In addition, there are concerns about a good "fit" for our congregation (i.e., the size of the sanctuary and difficult handicapped access.)

In after-church meetings last October and November, the Committee on Shared Ministry -- Chuck Forster, Emilee Solomon, and Susan Kaphammer -- encouraged members to consider how we experience and further our missions around community, spirituality, justice and learning. Additional interviews of church members and friends added perspectives. Meanwhile, the Board appointed Ray Gonzales, Nancy Born and Ray Yates to gather information about possibilities and expenses for options. Information from both of these efforts will be provided in the upcoming meetings so that the question of how to best "House Our Ministry" can be meaningfully discussed at our Annual Meeting on June 9.




There is no established deadline for this decision.

Gather to Talk Books!



May 14, 2019: The Underground Railroad: A Novel by Colson Whitehead

In Colson Whitehead's ingenious conception, the Underground Railroad is no mere


metaphor: engineers and conductors operate a secret network of actual tracks and tunnels beneath the Southern soil. The novel follows Cora, a young slave from a cotton plantation in Georgia, on her harrowing flight from one state to the next, encountering, like Gulliver, strange yet familiar iterations of her own world at each stop. Re-creating the terrors of the antebellum era, Whitehead weaves into his novel the saga of our nation from the brutal abduction of Africans to the unfulfilled promises of the present day.

July 9, 2019: A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles

In 1922, Count Alexander Rostov is deemed an unrepentant aristocrat by a Bolshevik tribunal, and is sentenced to house arrest in the Metropol, a grand hotel across the street



from the Kremlin. Rostov, an indomitable man of erudition and wit, has never worked a day in his life, and must now live in an attic room while some of the most tumultuous decades in Russian history are unfolding outside the hotel's doors. Unexpectedly, his reduced circumstances provide him entry into a much larger world of emotional discovery. Brimming with humor, a glittering cast of characters, and one beautifully rendered scene after another, this singular novel casts a spell as it relates the count's endeavor to gain a deeper understanding of what it means to be a man of purpose.
