In one on-again, off-again tradition — the UU kind! — our Minister reflects on where we are as a congregation and where we might be going.

Greetings from Rev. Ken Jones (a.k.a. "Ken's Ken.")

We welcomed a new year and (according to those whose memes are not dictated by mathematics) a new decade. We've survived the two awkward-sounding ones (the "oughts" and the "teens") and can now simply say we're living in the 20's. Whether or not they'll be "roaring" like the ones from the last century remains to be seen.

Some news suggests an omen. We welcomed this new year hearing about two horrific acts of violence at places of worship in this country – one at an Orthodox Hannukah celebration in New York, the other at a church in Texas. These kinds of tragedies have become all too common, and cut to the heart of a feeling of vulnerability for those who wish to claim peaceful spaces for worship and spiritual practice. If there be any sanctuary from the violence of the world, it is not unreasonable to hope that places of worship would be them. Tragically, that is not the case.

This news has also spurred conversation among many about what religious communities can or should do to insure a measure of safety for their practitioners. Specifically, some may wonder what we can do here at UUCY to either prevent such an atrocity or what to do if something like this happens in our own facility. More broadly, much of the debate centers on how to achieve safety, including the prospect of having armed guards or volunteers on hand to act as both a deterrent and an intervention. That the tragedy at the Texas church included a trained and armed volunteer who intervened to mitigate the tragedy has also spurred more debate about this, with some claiming that it is evidence that having more guns in the hands of "good people" makes us safer. (It is interesting to note, however, that the incident in New York in which there weren't any armed guards but in which the assailant also yielded only a knife resulted in much less harm.)

It is good, of course, for us to have some conversation about this and to consider ways to help insure everyone's safety. But I also encourage us to keep in mind that despite the horrific nature of the news and how it affects us, that churches and other places of worship are, by and large, very safe places to be – probably safer than the roads we drive on to get there. I hope and pray that fear of such violence never discourages anyone from seeking out or participating in religious community, for I believe that compassionate and brave religious communities help bring more peace and understanding to our world. Perhaps that is why they are sometimes targeted by those whose aim is to inflict more violence. The best thing we can do is to stay true to our principles, and to have faith in the healing power of justice and compassion that is foundational to our being.

A Notice from Rev. Ken Jones: 'Phishing' Attacks

Some of you have seen weird-looking emails that appear to be from me asking for help of one sort or another. Hopefully you have all been cautious enough to refrain from responding directly to such emails, or complying with the request. This is happening, near as I can tell, in epic proportions at UU and other congregations all across the country. Most recently, I've heard it happening to people via text messages in addition to emails, so we all need to be on the lookout for anything suspicious. What these events are is commonly called "phishing," which is different than "hacking," as no passwords or other security measures are breached. This is when a user gathers basic information such as names off our church website or other media, then creates a fake email address that looks like it is from me, the Minister. The most important thing to remember is if you ever receive an email or text from me or someone else in the congregation that in any way appears suspicious -- asking for money or gift cards, asking to reply, etc -- to be suspicious. Check with me or the church office to ask if I did indeed send this. Also, double-check the actual email address or phone number the email or text is received from (not just the name that appears on the screen) to see if it is my real email address (which would be either minister@uucyakima.org or revkbj86@yahoo.com.)

Thanks to you all for understanding that we live in a complicated world!

Swashbucklers will consider Captain Blood and his buccaneering ways on Saturday, January 11th from 12-1:30 p.m.




Stay Calm, and READ On!



They are available from the Yakima Valley Libraries in print and electronic versions, and at a discount from Inklings Bookshop by mentioning our book club.

January 14, 2020: Educated by Tara Westover

Raised largely 'off the grid' in rural Idaho - without school, doctor visits, a birth certificate, or even a family consensus on the date of her birth - Tara nevertheless decides she wants to go to college. This is a story in two parts: First, Tara's childhood working in a dangerous scrapyard alongside her six siblings, her survivalist father, and her mother, a conflicted but talented midwife and healer, while fearing Y2K and the influence of the secular world; then, her departure from her mountain home to receive an education.







March 10, 2020: Pachinko by Min Jin Lee

PACHINKO follows one Korean family through the generations, beginning in early 1900s Korea with Sunja, the prized daughter of a poor yet proud family, whose unplanned pregnancy threatens to shame them all. Deserted by her lover, Sunja is saved when a young tubercular minister offers to marry and bring her to Japan. So begins a sweeping saga of an exceptional family in exile from its homeland and caught in the indifferent arc of history. Through desperate struggles and hard-won triumphs, its members are bound together by deep roots as they face enduring questions of faith, family, and identity.

May 12, 2020: Scythe by Neal Shusterman

A world with no hunger, no disease, no war, no misery: Humanity has conquered all those things and has even conquered death. Now *Scythes* are the only ones who can end life, and they are commanded to do so in order to keep the size of the population under control. Citra and Rowan are chosen to apprentice to a *scythe*, a role that neither wants. These teens must master the "art" of taking life, knowing that the consequence of failure could mean losing their own.

In 2020, the Women's March on Yakima invites all in our community to come together to amplify their activism for civil and human rights.


