# Greetings from Rev. Ken Jones (a.k.a. "Ken's Ken.")

Last January, I wrote in this column, among others, these words:

"... the recent UUCY Board retreat at which I informed the board that I'm not planning to renew my contract again when it expires at the end of June, making this my last year as your half-time Minister. I've thought long and hard about this decision, and it is not an easy one to make, yet I feel it is the right decision."

That, of course, was last January, which seems to many of us now like a whole different era. I had no idea then that in the coming weeks we'd wind up cancelling church services and all events in our building, or that many of us would find our only contact with others in our church community through the screens of our electronic devices, or that many of our lives would be put on hold for several months or even a year while we tried to protect ourselves and our community from a new and vicious virus.

I also wrote this: "I'm completing my tenth year here at UUCY, which is a good tenure for a part-time Minister... That is, I think, something to celebrate!" Unfortunately, whatever celebrations we may have had these last few months or in this final one have taken a back seat to the necessity of us re-imagining how we do church during a pandemic. That doesn't bother me much personally, because I admit to being the kind of person who tends to sneak out of parties via the back door when no one is looking, just because I don't usually enjoy saying "good-bye." So it looks like that is what will happen here – rather than going out with a bang, I'll be taking my leave in the quiet of night, as it were.

As I said back in January, I still plan to continue living in Yakima for the time being, so these words from my previous column are still relevant: "I have professional obligations that stipulate that as a departing Minister I will not be involved in any way in the congregation for some time, and will not have any 'pastoral' contact with people at UUCY. So when I inevitably bump into some of you around town, I won't engage in any conversation about the church or engage with anything that may fall into the realm of a Ministerial role. But I'll sure enjoy saying 'hi' and hearing and sharing how things are going!" I wanted to repeat those words in this column for emphasis. I'll also add that my professional obligations also stipulate that I disengage with all congregation members on social media. As I will remain in the community, I don't intend to "unfriend" you all en masse, but I will take care to not engage in too much or inappropriate exchanges with you on social media. I will also be leaving the UUCY Private Discussion Group on Facebook.

There is a lot of uncertainty in our world and our community these days, and it is perhaps unfortunate that the added uncertainty for UUCY about your Minister adds to that mix. It is understandable this might add to some people's fears. For that, I'll close with these favorite words from one of my Minister colleagues, Rev. Sara York:

We receive fragments of holiness, glimpses of eternity, brief moments of insight. Let us gather them up for the precious gifts they are and, renewed by their grace, Move boldly into the unknown.

#### **ZOOM Into UUCY Book Club**



This summer selection, on many "Best Books of 2018" lists, provides "a monumental novel about trees and people." A little longer than many of our selections, pick up a copy by audio book or by arrangements with Inklings (mention our book club and get a discount). Then settle in with an iced tea in the shade, perhaps under a tree, and get carried away to the overstory!

#### **The Overstory** by Richard Powers

An Air Force loadmaster in the Vietnam War, an artist who inherits a hundred years of photographic portraits, a hard-partying undergraduate in the late 1980, a hearing- and speech-impaired scientist studying trees, and five other strangers are summoned to save the continent's few remaining acres of virgin forest.

In his twelfth novel, National Book Award winner Richard Powers delivers a sweeping, impassioned novel of activism and resistance that is also a stunning evocation and paean to the natural world. From the roots to the crown and back to the seeds, The *Overstory* unfolds in concentric rings of interlocking fables that range from antebellum New York to the late twentieth-century Timber Wars of the Pacific Northwest and beyond, exploring the vast, slow, interconnected, resourceful, and magnificently inventive world beside ours that is almost invisible to us.



This is the story of a handful of people who learn how to see that world and who are drawn up into its unfolding catastrophe. The *Overstory* is a book for all readers who despair of humanity's self-imposed separation from the rest of creation and who hope for the transformative, regenerating possibility of a homecoming.
