UUCY Book Club Seeks Varied Stories



September 8, 2020; The Readers of Broken Wheel Recommend by Katarina Bivald.

This heartwarming story in which books play a role in changing lives introduces Sara, a quiet, dependable bookstore clerk in Sweden. Her store closes and she determines to do something a little daring. So Sara travels to a small town in lowa to visit Amy, with whom she shares a love of books but who she has only met through correspondence.


Sara arrives in Broken Wheel, Iowa, to find that Amy, beloved in her town, had been ill and has recently died. The town's quirky residents are determined to fulfill the visit and scoop Sara up into the life of the town. Both Sara and the town are changed.

Funny and sometimes familiar to those who have lived in a close-knit community, our own visit to Broken Wheel is a quick-read adventure. (If you don't find a copy through the library or bookstore, I have one you can borrow.).



November 10, 2020; Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI by David Grann.

Reading like a twisting, haunting, murder mystery, this true account relates the early twentieth-century murders of dozens of wealthy Osage and law-enforcement officials, citing the contributions and missteps of a fledgling FBI that eventually uncovered one of the most chilling conspiracies in American history.



In the 1920s, the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Indian Nation in Oklahoma, after oil was discovered beneath their land, Then one Osage woman, Mollie Burkhart, watched as her family was murdered. It was just the beginning, as more Osage began to die under mysterious circumstances. When virtually anyone who dared to investigate the killings were themselves murdered, the newly created F.B.I. took up the case, initially bungling the investigation.

Based on years of research and startling new evidence, the book is a masterpiece of narrative nonfiction, as each step in the investigation reveals a series of sinister secrets and reversals. What emerges is a searing indictment of the callousness and prejudice toward Native Americans that allowed the murderers to operate with impunity for so long.
