As many epidemiologists predicted, the return of cooler weather is bringing on another wave of the COVID-19 pandemic – the number of diagnosed cases and deaths seems to be increasing around the world.

This means that UUCY will continue to avoid risky activities through the winter. This includes in-person indoor Sunday Services. At this point, it is impossible to know when we will be able to resume services in our sanctuary, given the fact that so many of us belong to populations at high risk (for example, those over 60 years old.)

The good news is that the Sunday Services Committee is doing a great job putting together services using "virtual" platforms, such as the streaming of Sunday services from other UU churches, and locally produced services on Zoom.

If you haven't participated in these, you should give it a try. If you're not familiar with Zoom, or are uncomfortable with computer applications in general, it will be a little awkward for you at first, but you might be surprised at how quickly you adapt. (Even if you don't have a computer you can participate via phone.)

And, of course, with any questions or problems you may have, friendly help is just a phone call away. Genevieve, the members of the committee and I are all available to answer questions or help with technical stuff.

From Your UUCY Social Justice Committee: Phil Dindia and Carole Sahlstrand

Alongside connections with our membership, your Social Justice Committee is proposing some ways to connect with our Yakima community by doing our part to ensure that "the arc of the universe bend toward justice", a phrase Martin Luther King Jr. borrowed from Theodore Parker, a 19th century Unitarian theologian.

- 1. Continue regular donations to La Casa Hogar and Planned Parenthood, agencies we pledged to support for two years.
- 2. Keep wearing a face mask and maintain six feet of social distance around others not in your bubble.
- 3. Donate to Justice Housing, a non-profit raising money to build thirty tiny homes in Yakima for the houseless. Before her death, Ellie Lambert was a committed supporter of this project. There is a fund in her name that you can support: Justice Housing, P.O. Box 1097, Yakima, WA 98907.
- 4. Reach out to the Latino community, hardest hit by the virus, by employing those whose skills match your need and by using their restaurants for take-out.
- 5. Donate food or cash to local agencies that distribute assistance to the needy of our city and county.



UUCY Book Club Seeks Varied Stories

Meeting by Zoom has not inhibited lively discussions of an eclectic selection of books. As always, everyone is invited to tune in and offer your thoughts, or just listen even if you have not read the current title. Books selected are available from Yakima Valley Libraries, often in hardcopy and electronic versions. They are also out in paperback and available through Inklings Bookshop at a "Book Club Member" discount. November 10, 2020; Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI by David Grann.

Reading like a twisting, haunting, murder mystery, this true account relates the early twentieth-century murders of dozens of wealthy Osage and law-enforcement officials, citing the contributions and missteps of a fledgling FBI that eventually uncovered one of the most chilling conspiracies in American history.



In the 1920s, the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Indian Nation in Oklahoma, after oil was discovered beneath their land, Then one Osage woman, Mollie Burkhart, watched as her family was murdered. It was just the beginning, as more Osage began to die under mysterious circumstances. When virtually anyone who dared to investigate the killings were themselves murdered, the newly created F.B.I. took up the case, initially bungling the investigation.

Based on years of research and startling new evidence, the book is a masterpiece of narrative nonfiction, as each step in the investigation reveals a series of sinister secrets and reversals. What emerges is a searing indictment of the callousness and prejudice toward Native Americans that allowed the murderers to operate with impunity for so long.
