This past June, I attended "GA" (the UUA's annual General Assembly.) I did it from the comfort of my living room, since it was held 100% online, due to COVID. Some of the presentations were of particular interest to us. One was "The Post-Pandemic Small Congregation", presented by 4 ministers from UUA's "Congregational Life" staff, including Sarah Schurr, who is our liaison to the PNWD.

Each of the 4 identified characteristics they had observed in small congregations that enabled them to survive, even thrive, during the time that in-person meetings did not occur. The number one characteristic was to "focus on mission" -- which prompted me to reacquaint myself with our mission statement. Here it is:

We celebrate community and promote spirituality, justice, responsibility and compassion.

Notice that community comes first. I think we tried hard to keep our community together during the time we couldn't meet face to face, what with Zoom meetings and the efforts of our Caring and Concerns Committee, and that we did a pretty good job of ministering to the needs of our members, especially considering the other challenges we were facing (no professional minister; sale of old church home and move to a new one, just to name a few!)

However, we can always do better, and I think how we can improve our ministry should be one of the primary issues we examine, as we work during the coming church year to define our future.

By attending the August 15 service, all you members and friends can help us get started on that effort. I hope to see you there.


## "BOOKS ARE A UNIQUELY PORTABLE MAGIC." - Stephen King

#### September 14, 2021: The Bookshop of the Broken Hearted by Robert Hillman

It is 1968 in rural Australia and lonely Tom Hope can't make heads or tails of Hannah Babel. Newly arrived from Hungary, Hannah is unlike anyone he's ever met--she's passionate, brilliant, and fiercely determined to open sleepy Hometown's first bookshop. Despite the fact that Tom has only read only one book in his life, when Hannah hires him to install shelving for the shop, the two discover an astonishing spark. Recently abandoned by an unfaithful wife--and still missing her sweet son, Peter-Tom dares to believe that he might make Hannah happy. But Hannah is a haunted woman. Twenty-four years earlier, she had been marched to the gates of Auschwitz.




Their story cherishes the power of love, literature, and forgiveness to transform our lives, and if we dare allow them, to mend our broken hearts.

### November 9, 2021: Hamnet by Maggie O'Farrell

England, 1580: The Black Death creeps across the land, and a young Latin tutor—penniless and bullied by a violent father—falls in love with an extraordinary, eccentric young woman. Agnes is a wild creature who walks her family's land with a falcon on her glove and is known throughout the countryside for her unusual gifts as a healer, understanding plants and potions better than she does people. Once she settles with her husband on in Stratford-upon-Avon she becomes a fiercely protective mother and a steadfast, centrifugal force in the life of her young husband, whose career on the London stage is taking off when his beloved young son succumbs to sudden fever.

A luminous portrait of a marriage, a shattering evocation of a family ravaged by grief and loss, and a tender and unforgettable re-imagining of a boy whose life has been all but forgotten.
