
#### September 8, 2022: Where the Crawdads Sing by Della Owens


For years, rumors of the "Marsh Girl" have haunted Barkley Cove, a quiet town on the North Carolina coast. She's barefoot and wild; unfit for polite society. So in late 1969, when handsome Chase Andrews is found dead, the locals immediately suspect Kya Clark. But Kya is not what they say. Abandoned at age ten, she has survived on her own in the marsh that she calls home. A born naturalist with just one day of school, she takes life lessons from the land, learning from the false signals of fireflies the real way of this world. But while she could have lived in solitude forever, the time comes when she yearns to be touched and loved. Drawn to two young men from town, who are each intrigued by her wild beauty, Kya opens herself to a new and startling world--until the unthinkable happens.

#### November 10, 2022: Klara and the Sun by Kazuo Ishiguro

Klara, an Artificial Friend with outstanding observational qualities, is designed to be a playmate for real children. From her place in the store, Klara watches carefully the behavior of those who come in to browse, and of those who pass in the street outside. She remains hopeful a customer will soon choose her, but when the possibility emerges that her circumstances may change forever, she is warned not to invest too much in the promises of humans.

In this luminous tale, Nobel Prize winner Kazuo Ishiguro looks at our rapidly changing modern world through the eyes of an unforgettable narrator to explore a fundamental question: what does it mean to love?





Our November title, *Klara and the Sun* by Kazuo Ishiguro, is available as a Book Club Set from the Yakima Valley Libraries. On October 1, will pick up 8 copies to distribute to Book Clubbers at church on October 2 and at Wednesday coffee on October 5. That gives us about five weeks reading time before our discussion. If you are interested in reading and discussing this book but can't pick a copy up one of these days, give Susan as call so we can make other arrangements. These copies must then be left with Susan after our discussion to be returned to the library. No fees, minimal fuss – let's see how this works for us!
