### June 4: Kindness Matters with Susan Kaphammer

Who doesn't need a little kindness these days? Susan will lead us in a discussion surrounding kindness. Please come prepared to share a kindness that you have received or have given.

#### June 11: "Connecting Polar Regions with Global Climate: Ice Cores, Albedo Feedback, and the Polar Front" with Miles McPhee

Miles will talk about connections between the Arctic and mid-latitude climate, both in terms of what is happening now in a "1 degree world" (the change since preindustrial times), and what ice cores from Greenland and Antarctica suggest about what is in store for the future.

Here is bit about our speaker: "I grew up near Naches, graduated from Stanford in engineering, then obtained a Ph.D. in Geophysics from the University of Washington, with a thesis on the ocean boundary layer under sea ice. I spent the next four decades doing polar air-ice-ocean research, which included participating in roughly two dozen field projects on ice in the Arctic and Antarctic. Much of that research was directly relevant to understanding climate change at high latitudes and elsewhere."


### **BOOK CLUB MEETS AGAIN ON JULY 13**

A small but enthusiastic group of readers met in May at Susan Kaphammer's home for a long discussion of *Bold Spirit* by Linda Hunt. We were glad to make the acquaintance of the brave Helga Estby and her daughter, while we regretted the aftermath of their trek. Beyond the researched events, we shared responses to the addendum on "family secrets." It was a companionable and enjoyable evening.

The next meeting of our UUCY Book Club (Everyone Welcome!) will be at <u>6:00 PM on</u> <u>Thursday, July 13</u>. We will gather at a place to be determined, based on where we land for a more permanent church home. Bring a snack if you wish, and be prepared to share your observations and questions about *The Burgess Boys*. Named one of the Best Books of the Year by *The Washington Post*, and NPR, this novel explores shifting adult sibling relationships, ties to childhood homes, and the impact of undeserved guilt. The book is available in hard copy and electronic format from Yakima Libraries, and from Inklings Bookshop at book club discount.

#### The Burgess Boys by Elizabeth Strout 2014. 320 pages.

Haunted by the freak accident that killed their father when they were children, Jim and Bob Burgess escaped from their Maine hometown of Shirley Falls for New York City as soon as they possibly could. Jim, a sleek, successful corporate lawyer, has belittled his bighearted brother their whole lives, and Bob, a Legal Aid attorney who idolizes Jim, has always taken it in stride. But their long-standing dynamic is upended when their sister, Susan—the Burgess sibling who stayed behind—urgently calls them home when her lonely teenage son, Zach, has gotten himself into a world of trouble. When the Burgess brothers return to the landscape of their childhood, the long-buried tensions that have shaped and shadowed their relationship begin to surface in unexpected ways that will change them forever.
