Antiracism Learning Circles

On Zoom, organized by First Unitarian in Portland

You are invited to join Antracism Learning Circles this winter and spring. It's on Zoom, so you can join from anywhere! First Unitarian in Portland, OR is the organizer, and we are eager to include participation from all faiths and allies everywhere. We hope you can join us and that you'll help spread the word.

LEARNING CIRCLES are small discussion cohorts based on a book or podcast that provide:

- Important learning about white supremacy, racism, and our national history
- The opportunity to build trust and go deep in small group discussions over time
- A safe place to have difficult discussions and deal with discomfort
- An opportunity to create and strengthen relationships with others
- Connection, focus and purpose in a virtual setting

How Do LEARNING CIRCLES Work?

- Each cohort (typically 4-12) gathers for a series (from 4-10 sessions) of facilitated Zoom discussions.
- Register for a particular Learning Circle. Meeting dates & times vary.
- Each individual is given the opportunity to share reactions, then discuss as a group
- We ask that you plan to attend all sessions so we can build bonds of trust and insight

A partial selection of books, podcasts etc. to be discussion topics:

- Seeing White the real history of the US, the one none of us were taught in school. This is where to start your journey! (podcast series)
- The 1619 Project: A New Origin Story edited by Nikole Hannah-Jones a profoundly reveling vision of American past and present
- The Conspiracy to End America: Five Ways My Old Party is Driving Our Democracy to Autocracy by Stuart Stevens
- Say What You Mean: A Mindful Approach to Nonviolent Communication by Oren J. Sofer

DISCUSSION ON THURSDAY, JANUARY 11, 2024, 3 TO 5 PM



UU readers are buzzing about our January title: *The Bees* by Laline Paull (see below). We will meet to freely share our impressions, reactions and opinions. And, of course, to share cheerful time together! I am hoping that at least one of our members who has tended bee hives will be able to join us.

As always, everyone is welcome; if you haven't read the book, you are still invited to sit in with us at our church home at 407 N 1st Street, Suite 3. Optional: bring a snack to share.

The Bees by Laline Paull. 2015. 340 pages.

Flora 717 is a sanitation worker, a member of the lowest caste in her orchard hive, where work and sacrifice are the highest virtues and worship of the beloved Queen the only religion. But Flora is not like other bees. With circumstances threatening the hive's survival, her curiosity is regarded as a dangerous flaw, but her courage and strength are assets. She is allowed to feed the newborns in the royal nursery and then to become a forager, flying alone and free to collect nectar and pollen. A feat of bravery grants her access to the Queen's inner sanctum, where she discovers mysteries about the hive that are both profound and ominous. But when Flora breaks the most sacred law of all - daring to challenge the Queen's preeminence - enemies abound.
